Testing Grade 3 Learners for 2019's Grade 4



We are often asked how we select our promising learners. Trial and error have led us to a method which is generally successful. It takes more work, but it is worthwhile in the end.

Schools recommend their promising learners, and we then double-check their abilities via tests of our own. This year, we tested from 10 Oct until 13 Oct. With an average of **15** learners per school, we tested **85** learners. **Seven** schools participated and we sent our small bus to collect the eager Grade 3 learners from these schools.


Of these learners we selected only **28** to return for further testing in Reading. From them, we selected **24** promising learners, for Grade 2019. We then

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Reading Makes me Clever!

We do our best, year-round, to instil this value into the conscious knowledge of our learners. It is a truth which is so often forgotten. Sadly, the school syllabus lets our nation of scholars down badly in this regard....The syllabus gives time and emphasis to the teaching of reading from Grade 1 – 4 and after that, it is taken for granted that the children of Namibia can read. No more reading lessons, no more time specifically allocated to the teaching of reading. Given that teachers are usually not competently trained to teach reading in the first place; and that graded reading books are simply not provided, it is no surprise that our national literacy rate is appallingly low.

Our learners often enter the system with very limited English, speak only their cultural languages at home and with their friends, and very few are actually 'ready' to learn how to read well, in their early years. They are then pushed up to grade 4 and above with a low reading ability, and this is never addressed again. Some children fail their grades from this point onwards, until they are 'promoted' out of the school system because of their age.



Sadly many Namibian reports look like this.

MYO addresses this problem seriously. We continue with structured Reading lessons until the end of grade 8; during our English lessons we add Class Reading with some exciting story, or play-reading to bring in a difference, and then we have a good stock of stories and reference books available in our library. It is a three-fold initiative. We show and prove to our learners that even maths is a 'reading' subject, and that without the ability to read fluently, with understanding, they will never be well educated.

Extra Encouragement!

MYO manager, Babs Oosthuizen had yet another very cunning strategy! In the office Babs kept a limited supply of really popular story books, and these books were lent out during particular lessons, to one class only. They had to be returned at the end of that lesson, and they had to be shared amongst that select number of readers. Oh, but the competition was fierce! Eager children rushed in to secure their chosen books, and progress was carefully marked via book marks. Interest and enjoyment were at peak, and the whole process was a great success. Babs borrowed the books from her clever grandchildren who



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We follow our past learners very carefully, keeping our experienced fingers on them at all times, guiding them, answering their queries and often helping them in times of

at all times, guiding them, answering their queries and often helping them in times of need. We follow them through Grade 10, then Grade 12 and even into their extended study or career fields. We need to know that our investment in them has been good, and that we have made a difference.

How delighted we are then, to inform you, that for the 2018 examinations, any learner that went through our hands, passed the exam – most of them achieving top symbols in the subjects they were taught at MYO. We can proudly tell you that Grade 10 MYO learners had a 100% pass rate! (Namibia wide, the pass rate is sadly just above 50%)

Grade 12 results are not completely out at this time, as we still await Ordinary Grade marks, but the assessment of those who wrote their exams on Higher Grade shows that without any further mark coming in from their lower grade subjects, several of our alumni have already gained enough marks to qualify for acceptance to tertiary studies!

Grade 12 is difficult to assess, as the students write Higher and Lower grade examinations, and without fail, some of them lose their way, having left MYO 4 years previously. We motivate them from Grade 10 onwards, but life is not simple and some do not meet the challenge. Having said that – we still see overall better results from the MYO alumni.

To close, here are the words of one of our students who spoke to us via WhatsApp, when we congratulated him on his excellent results:

"I owe my intelligence to MYO. I'm grateful that you could see potential in me that I had failed to see".

"At MYO it is often hard to explain to our donors what it is we do (Simply saying we give extra afternoon classes just doesn't cut it) And you have probably hit the nail on the head. We recognise potential and then nurture it and make it grow. You are a living example of that, as are many others who have degrees in a variety of fields. All the best for the future and please stay in touch with MYO and keep us informed of your progress and successes. We care about our alumni!

At MYO, we are very proud of our financial efficiency.

We spend approximately 97% of every dollar donated on goods and services that directly serve our core mission of educating students. We educate 120 learners at one time, and MYO's running costs, are approximately N\$1,6 million per annum despite our best cost cutting efforts.

We have been fortunate in recent years to have strong local support for our funding needs. But due to the current economic conditions in Namibia, we now find we need to seek funding from our international supporters.
